### REVAMPED POLITICAL SCIENCE MAJOR

### RATIONALE/JUSTIFICATION

The current political science major, with only 3 required courses, lacks rigor and coherence. The proposed changes will strengthen the core, which will ensure that students get solid grounding in the discipline. By pulling together the faculty's existing fortes and interests, the proposed specializations will provide students a set of logical tracks through which to move through the major. Flexibility will be maintained by allowing for a customized option. The handful of proposed changes in course numbering will allow for at least some degree of sequencing but will not close out students who would like to take political science or sociology courses to meet their general education requirements. The new courses proposed could all be taught by existing faculty.
